Dear members and friends of St. John's,

The Rev. Donald and Sylvia Yaekle, faithful members of St. John's, once brought this picture essay from *Life Magazine*, into our Adult Sunday School class. Rev. Donald was in and amongst this parade of black-robed marchers, celebrating the birth of the United Church of Christ in Cleveland 65 years ago, this coming June.

In the exact same year of 1957, the brand new sanctuary of St. John's United Church of Christ was being dedicated in March.

Elaine Gard has graciously agreed to offer abbreviated versions of these church histories, shared with our Confirmation Class.

We all belong to the one Christian Church, with includes all those who are the Lord's. But the branch in which we hold membership is the United Church of Christ. This is a union of two denominations, and each of those was formed by a union of two other denominations.

The REFORMED Church began in Switzerland and Germany. Economic hardships caused many reformers to come to this country and settle in Pennsylvania. The first congregations were the work of John Philip Boehm, a Pennsylvania school teacher, who founded a church at Faulkner Swamp in 1725. His friend Michael Schlatter began the formal organization of a synod, which brought the churches together to help one another. This denomination established many schools, colleges, and seminaries to train ministers, and a Board of Foreign Missions.

The EVANGELICAL Church grew out of the Lutheran and Reformed churches in Germany. Unrest over government control of the church led many of these Germans to come to the United States. Many of these immigrants settled in Illinois and Indiana with St. Louis as the center. Hermann Garlichs was asked to be the pastor of the church in Femme Osage in 1833. Louis Nollau brought churches like this together in 1840 in the German Evangelical Church Society of the West. This denomination provided homes for orphans and the aged, hospitals for the sick and care for the underprivileged.

These 2 denominations merged on June 26, 1934, in Cleveland, Ohio, to become the Evangelical and Reformed Church.

The CONGREGATIONAL Church came from the Separatists in England, who did not want to belong to the state church. In 1620, they sailed on the Mayflower for the New World. There were also a group of Puritans who settled in Massachusetts Bay. In 1648, they joined together to form the Congregational Churches. Horace Bushnell advanced the simple idea that "a child is

to grow up a Christian and never know himself otherwise." Samuel J. Mills and friends held a prayer meeting in the lee of a haystack in Williamstown, Massachusetts, which became the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions in 1810.

And the CHRISTIAN Church grew from the search for religious freedom and liberty of the late 1790s and early 1800s in North Carolina, Kentucky and Vermont. James O'Kelly was the central figure in the North Carolina movement. The followers of the movement believed that the followers of Christ did not need a large organization with many rules. Their purpose was to reform the world and to bring all Christians together. In 1810 the groups from the 3 states agreed to join together.

The Congregational and the Christian Churches became one denomination in 1931, the Congregational Christian Churches.

On March 18, 1941, conversations about the desirability of merging the CC Churches and the E&R Church began in Columbus, Ohio. The merger of these 2 denominations officially came together on June 25, 1957, in Cleveland, Ohio.

To celebrate these twin birthdays, we've chosen a Sunday, in-between, April the 24th, which is also Youth Sunday. After their presentation, our young people will serve cake after both services.

And in honor of the occasion, we've added a little in-house mystery. Elaine and others in the church believe that the black-robed gentleman with the black hair in the back row of the smaller picture, is our own Rev. Richard Hurdiss.

So what do you think? Take some time to let us know with an email or a note, along with favorite memories of Rev. Hurdiss, Rev. Yaekle, and the dedication of St. John's when Rev. Lammers was still here. We'll share your comments in the May Issue of *The Chimes*.

Easter: Good news for the broken! By Dave Miers

"For Christ died for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God." (1 Peter 3:18)

What has Jesus done to fix our brokenness?

Jesus died on the cross, on the first Good Friday. He didn't deserve to die on the cross. The "righteous for the unrighteous" means that Jesus is the innocent one dying in the place of the guilty. So his death for sin is a death to take the penalty for our sin and rejection of God.

Imagine you were playing a game of soccer and were exhausted. You are no longer able to run, kick or keep up with the general play. The best thing your coach can do is take you off and put one of the substitutes on in your place. Fresh legs, able to kick and energy for the rest of the game. The substitute takes your place and does what you were unable to do. They play on your behalf.

Jesus' death on the cross is as a substitute on your behalf. He plays on your behalf. Jesus lived the life I couldn't live and died the death I should have died.

The broken will be put back together

Jesus death and resurrection is good news for the broken. Why? Because it was "to bring you to God". The death of Jesus fixes our biggest problem. We can be brought back into relationship with God. That doesn't mean everything will automatically feel better here and now. We will still have to live with the consequences of a world that is broken. But inwardly we will be renewed. And there is a day coming when there will be no more tears and no more brokenness for those who belong to Jesus. Three days after Jesus died on Good Friday, he rose again on Easter. This quarantees that all who trust in Jesus will likewise be raised again.


