



I love Easter Lilies! I love the way they make the hallways smell when they're delivered to the church office! I love the way Gary Kinser displays them at the sunrise service and on the altar in the sanctuary! One of my favorite things to do is deliver lilies to our members and friends in assisted living and in their homes, who were unable to attend Easter Sunday worship.

A lily's trumpet-shaped petal and long-narrow leaves are sure to bring big smiles and plenty of excitement. It's as if these breathtakingly beautiful flowers are accompanying us as we sing, "Christ the Lord is Risen Today, Alleluia!"

According to hymnstudiesblog.wordpress.com, this hymn, "written by Charles Wesley (John's brother), celebrates one of the most important facts of the Bible – the resurrection of Jesus Christ!"

The Easter Lily is also one of the Christian Church's most well-known and recognizable symbols. Take a walk in the St. John's sanctuary before or after our worship services and see if you can locate the lilies in full bloom on our stained glass windows. At least theses etched-in white flowers look like them. What do you think?

Jill Gleeson writes in countryliving.com, that lilies are referred to as "white-robed apostles of hope," and were believed to "have sprouted from the ground where Christ's blood and tears fell during crucifixion."


It's thought that Easter lilies came to symbolize Christ, and not only because they embody purity. The life cycle of Easter lilies, which grow from a bulb for several years beneath the earth before blossoming into magnificent flowers, recalls Jesus' death and resurrection. What other springtime flower could possibly represent Easter and Christ better?

Perhaps that is why my dear mother, the ever-impatient gardener, couldn't wait to get at her flower beds in the Spring. She was quick to have my father dig a hole to plant her Lily bulbs, weeks before the last frost. Having been a Presbyterian Sunday School Teacher, she knew that flowers take time to grow within, just like these verses from Scripture.

"Consider how the wild flowers grow. They do not labor or spin. Yet I tell you, not even Solomon in all his splendor was dressed like one of these. If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today, and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, how much more will he clothe you—you of little faith! (Luke 12:27-28)

It's no coincidence that the Easter season is the perfect time to plants seeds of God's Living Word. As they grow deep within our hearts, you and I will be like the Easter Lily by trumpeting that the amazing grace and the universal love of Jesus Christ is alive and well, Alleluia!

The Afternoon Círcle -

and their Guests will meet on Wednesday, May 4, 2022, at Noon, in the Fellowship Room, to celebrate their 150th Anniversary.

A Salad Smorgasbord will be served, along with mini-sandwiches, coffee, tea and punch. After a brief history of the entire Women's Guild of St. John's Church, the group will move to the sanctuary for an outstanding Piano Recital by Mrs. Jane Shoemaker. Afterwards, returning to the Fellowship Room, the group will find cake and a birthday celebration before the ladies head for home.

A reminder to all Members and Guests: Remember to bring your annual Anniversary Offering of 1 penny for each year old the Circle is = \$1.50. Thank you.

On May 9, 1872, Rev. Polster called about 70 women to meet in the sanctuary of St. John's former building on the corner of 5th and Poplar, to form the "Frauen und Jungfrauen Verein", the Ladies' and Young Ladies' Society. This group has met on the first Wednesday afternoon of each month since then. The name has been changed several times. Other ladies' groups have been formed, their names were changed, and they were disbanded over time, but the Afternoon Circle has continued to meet for fellowship, to share and grow their faith, to look after the sick and those in need, and to be of service to God, St. John's and this community. The Afternoon Circle is the longest existing organization within the history of St. John's Church.

The Missionary Society, the Evening Circle, the Sewing Circle, the Dorcas Circle, the Pollyanna Circle, were all under the umbrella of the Women's Guild of St. John's Church. Several of these groups had name changes over the years, as has our denomination. Many ladies, as circumstances changed, went from one "circle" to another. Groups had memberships of from over 100 ladies, to smaller numbers, now 16.

Our circles held membership in outside organizations like the Synod and Association clusters, and the interfaith Church Women United. Our ladies fed neighborhood children during the Depression, helped keep food on the table at our Home for the Aged in Upper Sandusky, sewed clothing for children in India, hosted clothing drives for missions, sewed thousands of cancer pads, made hundreds of Easter baskets for mental health patients, sewed choir and confirmation robes, and scores of costumes. 2/3 of the Altar Guild were members of the circles. The Nursery was under the Evening Circle for years. No job has been too big or too small for our ladies.
