From the Pastor



Why Time Flies

We've all heard the phrases, "Time flies when you're having fun," or "Where does time go" or "I just turned around and this or that happened." The passage of time has been a mystery since the beginning of humanity, and it is one that we can't seem to unlock or decipher.

Here we are in August with Summer melting away and I'm sure we are all wondering where it all has gone.

The Bible puts it this way in Ecclesiastes 3:11: "He has made everything beautiful in its time. God has also set time in the human heart, yet no one can fathom what God has done from beginning to end."

Scientists tell us there are several reasons for the phenomenon and sensation of time passing quickly Here are a few I've discovered while researching this topic:

****Routine and Familiarity——As our life becomes more routine and familiar, our brain tends to register fewer "new" experiences and less distinct memories. Which can make time appear to go faster.

****Attention and Absorption——When fully engaged in an activity or "state of flow", our attention is focused on that activity or event and in that process we lose awareness of the moment-by-moment passage of time, making it feel like time is going more quickly

****Proportionality of Time———A year represents a smaller portion of a longer life. For a young child, a year is a large fraction of their existence. But as we age, it becomes a much smaller one. This contributes to the feeling that time speeds up as we age.

****Body Temperature——-Changes in body temperature can also affect time perception. Higher temperatures, like Summer brings, are associated with the feeling of faster subjective time.

While the physical passage of time remains constant, the subjective experience of it is influenced by a combination of factors like the ones noted above.

Our perception of time can be startling. But when we remember that God is the author of time and that He has our days planned out and numbered, we can relax knowing God has the best in store for you and me.

Whether time goes fast or slow, it is all in His hands. But we have an important part to play. Namely using the time we have wisely and making the most of each moment.

One concrete way we can do that is by participating in Church each week. Combine that with meaningful times with family and friends and always reserving our personal moments with God, and we will know that all of it is definitely time well spent. May time become your friend and may each moment bring blessings.

Church records indicate that in May of 1839, fifty-two men were members of the German Evangelical Lutheran Reformed Church. On <u>July 18, 1841</u>, twenty-five religiously

inclined German men, under the leadership of Rev. Martin Schaad, united in a religious organization which was incorporated as the GERMAN EVANGELICAL PROTESTANT ST. JOHN'S CHURCH OF NEWARK, OHIO.



Well-Oiled Sheep

This line in Psalm 23 picks up on an interesting tidbit about the shepherd's care for his sheep. Shepherds will use oil on a sheep's head to keep pesky bugs away and to help protect the animal's skin from the sun.

The psalmist David's phrasing here also points symbolically to anointing as a calling or commissioning that comes from God. Anointing a person's head with oil was very significant in ancient Israel. David himself was anointed with oil when God chose him to be the king of Israel (1 Samuel 16:1-13). Prophets and priests were also anointed with oil (see Exodus 29:9; 1 Kings 19:15-16). And these anointings included more than just a few drops on the recipient's head. Psalm 133 describes the anointing oil as "running down on the beard" and dripping onto the collar of a person's robe. This picture describes something of the lavish blessing and equipping that God bestows on his dedicated servants.

When David says his cup overflows, he is referring to the lavishness of the shepherd's care and protection. The psalmist is overwhelmed by the goodness of God, despite the foolishness and wandering of his beloved sheep.

In what ways are you experiencing God's lavish care?

Generous Shepherd, fill our minds and hearts with memories of the many ways you care for and provide for us, watching over us always. We are grateful for the lavish abundance of your care. Amen.

MISSION TRIP WRAP UP

St. John's Mission Team traveled to Big Creek Missions in Kentucky June 29 to July 5 to serve the counties of Leslie and Hyden. The 11-member team was made up of Emmaleigh Crowthers, Greg

Crowthers, Remington Crowthers, Julie Davis, Paxton Hill, Colleen Kroah, Julie Kroah, Ken Kroah, Matthew Kroah. The Team worked to serve the community with their physical needs, but more importantly to bring the Gospel to a community that has more than its share of hopelessness and despair. They renovated a kitchen for a homeowner who is blind, rebuilt unstable floors and foundations, worked with kids at 1 of the 2 day camps, assembled weekly food boxes for 1,125 people and hosted a free community July Fourth carnival. 
