#### Mission and Outreach Focus for October

Church World Service was founded in 1966 to create a hands-on opportunity to share love for our neighbors in a tangible way. Churches and other organizations provide donated supplies to make feminine hygiene kits, welcome backpacks, school kits, hygiene kits, and clean-up buckets for those in need around the world. Previously we have donated feminine hygiene packs. This year, the Afternoon Circle has generously donated \$300.00 which has been used to purchase supplies for 4 "Clean-up Buckets." Purchased supplies included 4 buckets which are now filled with pump spray air freshener, 5 scouring pads, 7 sponges, 1 scrub brush, 18 reusable dry cleaning towels, 1 bottle of laundry detergent, 1 bottle of dish soap, 1 bottle of household cleaner, 1 pack of clothespins, 1 clothesline, 5 N95 dust masks, 2 pair dishwashing gloves, 1 pair work gloves, 24 construction-type trash bags, 1 bottle of insect repellent. These kits are used in times of flooding or other disasters, and the U.C.C. has a long-standing partnership with Church World Service. The buckets will be our donation to the truck they will be loading at the Central Southeast Association Meeting (U.C.C). in Canal Winchester on October 25, 2025.

#### **Our Servant-God**

Last year I took a course with mission leaders from around the world. On the first day, we were asked this question: How would you describe the central, gospel message of the Bible? I spoke up with an answer that reflects my church tradition. A few others chimed in with their answers.

After several people had spoken, a classmate from Ethiopia gave an answer that many of us did not expect. She said, "I think the story of the Bible centers on the story of God as a servant."

That got our attention. She went on to explain, "The Bible opens with God creating the world and caring for Adam and Eve. The rest of the Bible is the story of how God put into place a plan to serve the world through his Son, Jesus." And then she pointed out this beautiful detail: "The Bible ends with a picture of the new Jerusalem, which we are told will not need the sun or moon because God provides the light" (Revelation 21:23). From the beginning into eternity, God serves the world and all who are in it. I had never heard the good news framed in that way, reflecting a different perspective and cultural context.

If Jesus came not to be served but to serve, how does that affect the way we live each day? How should it affect the way we live?

Servant God, I am humbled by your willingness to do whatever was necessary to rescue me. Help me in my life to be a reflection of your self-giving heart. Amen.

#### See the Big Picture of Redemptive History

ASK THE

Standing up close to an impressionist painting gives you one view of the master's work – the intricacies of design, the vibrant colors, and the individual brush marks. However, backing away from the painting allows you to see the picture in its entirety. Just as we need both perspectives to be able to appreciate a painting to its fullest, we need both types of views as we read our Bibles.

Taking a year to read the Bible in its entirety allows us the opportunity to back up and observe the full picture. We see the larger story of Creation, Fall, Redemption, and Consummation in the midst of all the individual stories. All scripture contains the same DNA – Jesus is on every page, present in every story. The Gospel is repeated in shadows-like accounts, preparing us for the ultimate rescue. Reading the Bible through in a shorter amount of time also allows us a better opportunity to connect what we learned in Deuteronomy with the message of Galatians. You will glean insights that you might have missed (or forgotten) if you read it over a longer timespan.


